The Brackenheim Castle dates back to the 16th century and is a perfect example of the Renaissance style of architecture. The St. James Church embodies a later 18th century Gothic style and is quite impressive to say the least.

More medieval historic buildings are the Roccocco Hall, the Romanesque St. John's Basilica, and the Theodor Heuss Musuem.

The old town quarter is where you get to admire a number of half-timbered buildings that still retain their charming good looks.

Brackenheim's Chapel in the Castle is managed by the *Kulturforum* and this is where you need to go for a good dose of local culture. This may take the form of concerts, cabaret, and other live

performances.

Then there's the [Tripsdrill amusement park](#) (in nearby Cleebronn) with over a hundred different things to do, or so the organizers claim.

Brackenheim, being a large vine growing community, it has its share of wine tours and wine-tasting events which may prove quite heady experiences. The Doubtberg Wine Trail is quite popular but you could check out the Wine Info Center to get the best out of the experience.
