There is the huge Laacher See — which oddly translates to Laach Lake — filled with watersports, and many smaller lakes, some of which still bubble with volcanic activity! The whole region is very woody, but there are many agricultural areas with great village locations. And with three great nature parks in the Mayen-Koblenz District, there is plenty to do away from the rivers.
