In the coastal town of [Eckernförde](#), you can find all fourteen German submarines — all in this one location. It sits in a large bay, and the architecture and buildings reflect its cultural heritage and sailing past.

The industrious capital town of [Rendsburg](#) shares this heritage and although further inland, is a very important dockland and seaport. It also has one of only 20 “transporter bridges” anywhere in the world, crossing its canal!

The Rendsburg-Eckernförde District is also home to three major nature parks. The Hüttener Berge and the Westensee are both filled with scenic lakes and small forested areas, and to the west is the [Aukrug Nature Park](#) with its low hills and peaceful woodlands.
