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A third of the district is covered in lush forest and to the south — where it joins [Rhineland-Palatinate](#) — the delightful river terraces are decorated with extensive vineyards.

The district capital of [Siegburg](#) is filled with theater, music, museums and religion and feeds strongly off of [Cologne](#)'s cultural festivities. It also has a great history with the Benedictine abbey of St. Michael perched on a dormant volcano, and more recently with mining.

[Bad Honnef](#) in the south is famed for its spas and still attracts the wealthy visitor, and [Troisdorf](#) is weirdly famous for its Picture Book museum!

[Königswinter](#) is known across Germany, not only for its **Rhine in Flames** (*Rhein in Flammen*) festival in May, but also for the oldest nature reserve in the whole of Germany — the [Siebengebirge](#) — filled with myth and legend!
